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Great River Race

The Great River, London's River Marathon, is a spectacular traditional pulling boat race up the River Thames, from Docklands to Ham House, that attracts over 300 crews from all over the globe.

It is a unique sight, the river filled with every kind of boat from pilot gigs, whalers and skiffs to Hawaiian outriggers and boats. Every year, dragon Leander enters Scout, Explorer and Adult gig crews and this year the Scout crew won the 'Ted Springer Trophy' for the fastest under-14 junior crew. Using one of our two much-loved clinker built wooden gigs, now over 60 years old, the Scouts successfully won their class. A brilliant result as there was a strong headwind and rough water much of the way, making for a very tough 21 mile race.

The Explorers also came in with a very good time and the Mutineers, a fine crew of Leaders and parents, couldn't quite match their class-winning time from last year, but had to settle for the fastest Home Counties gig back – always next year!

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Boat Deck Business

Quite a bit of work is being done on the Boat Deck as we are getting rid of some of the boating junk that accumulates over the years. With such a large Troop now we need to use virtually all our pulling boats and we need the room to move them around. We are very pleased with the new canoe trolley, designed by Nigel Duffin, which makes handling and storing our open canoes much easier.

All the boat fittings are being transferred to a dedicated section at the back of the deck, eventually some of the heavy racking will be relocated to make handling kayaks easier and our old coypus will be stored on a special covered rack to be erected outside. Many of our boat trolleys are now showing signs of wear and tear; they have given great service over the years but will need to be replaced for next year's boating season.

I was given the go-ahead recently, because we had available funds to run the project. I only wish we had been able to do it when I was a Scout at Leander.

As it stands we have the guns, ammunition, targets and target holders. The proposed range now has lights, deflection curtains and a backboard to accommodate four targets. There's still some protective shielding to be put in place and backing for the target boards. I also need a secure cabinet to keep the guns in but, hopefully by the time you read this, these things will be in place. All that remains is Risk а Assessment and then Parental Permission forms can be sent out for those wishing to take part.

The time and days that we can run shooting will then need to be decided. A time when the HQ is not being used by other people is preferable but not essential. I realise that many people have other activities they take part in during the weekday evenings and at weekends, so we'll have to come to a consensus as to what time and days suit the most people.

As we will only have four targets and can probably only take a maximum of 12-16 per session, a rota will probably be needed. Myself, Simon B, Jim M, Karen and Robin are all qualified to run the activity but we too have lives and families outside of Leander, which will also have a bearing on the times and days of the sessions. Hopefully I will be able to hand out the consent forms soon so we can get the activity under way before Christmas.

Stefan Davies

Stefan Davies was a Scout in Leander in the 1960s and 1970s. His parents were active supporters of the Group. He recently died of a brain tumour and his friend Anthony (Ant) Merriman recalled their time in Leander at Stefan's funeral.

I was first introduced to Stefan when I joined Leander, age 13, 48 years ago. Stef quickly made me feel part of the Group. We had a lot in common. Neither of us was very keen on school, but Stef had the advantage of having many practical skills.

We got up to all sorts of mischief together as Scouts Venture Scouts. We attended several camps together. The campsites often had no facilities and we dug latrines and cooked on open fires. My recollection of Stef's practical application was the 'interesting' methods he employed to get a cooking fire going. I am not sure his father, who was in the fire service, would have approved!

During that stage of our lives, the Queen's Scout Award & Duke of Edinburgh Gold award became a very important part of what we were trying to achieve.

One Summer, Stefan and I took a group of Venture Scouts up to the Isle of Arran. Our planning was such in those days that we filled the mini bus with what we thought we needed and went!

We were driving an old Commer minibus, belonging to Leander. Stefan roped me in to help him change the differentia about 10 days before the trip. The differential originally came from an old Humber Hawk and. although it was the same size, the ratio of the gearing was not the same and the speedometer was linked to the differential. reading οn speedometer was always wrong, and I remember sitting in the passenger seat and being asked by Stef to look at the speedometer of a vehicle we were passing to see what speed we were doing!

In our travels on Arran, another motorist had got into trouble by putting the rear wheel of their vehicle in a ditch. There were eight large lads in the minibus, who Stef had get out and lift the vehicle out of the ditch, so it could be driven again.

Stefan eventually became an ambulance driver and then a paramedic. As a paramedic you would have felt very safe in his hands: he had tremendous patience and ability to put people at the ease. He was an amazing caring man and saved many lives.

Leander helped us develop life skills which we carried with us for the rest of our lives.
